## **Dr Emily Floeck**

Matriculated at Trinity Hall in 2007: PhD in History, looking at the evolution of economic interdependence between the United States and China. Research was supervised by Andrew Preston (Clare College) and part-funded by the Commonwealth Trusts. In 2009 I was a visiting scholar at Boston University. I submitted my dissertation in October 2012 and passed my viva in early 2013.

While at Trinity Hall, I served on the MCR Committee for two years as Steward and later as external rep to CUSU and the GU. During this time, we undertook a variety of initiatives aimed at strengthening the Trinity Hall graduate community: these included the renovation of the MCR; the production of a new MCR website; the writing of a "welcome manual" aimed at international grad students arriving in Cambridge (possibly still floating around somewhere); and the creation of the Marshall McLuhan Symposium to foster interdisciplinary exchange at the graduate level. I also worked on the telephone fundraising campaign for the college, although I'm afraid I cannot recall which year.

In May 2013, inspired by a recommendation from Stephen Pax Leonard at Trinity Hall, I started at Brunswick Group, a global strategic communications agency headquartered in London. Here I worked on various M&A deals and IPOs as well as crisis management issues, primarily in the tech and mining sectors.

In October 2014 I was seconded from Brunswick to the European headquarters of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to support their communications work on the continent. In May 2015 I took up a full-time role at the Foundation, leading their media relations in Central and Southern Europe. About half my time is now spent supporting Bill and Melinda Gates as well as other foundation leadership on their public engagements in the region, particularly in Germany and France; the other half is dedicated to managing a portfolio of investments designed to increase engagement among European audiences on global health and development.

## **Ms Anne Wolff**

I went up to Trinity Hall in 1979 to study Economics as an undergraduate, the third year that women were accepted. I loved my time in Cambridge and took full advantage of what was on offer both in the university and college – I was an active member of the Cambridge Union Society and rowed for the Hall.

My first career was in finance – first qualifying as an accountant with Price Waterhouse, then moving in to international banking and venture capital. We moved as a family to Seattle, USA, in 1994 and spent a total of fourteen years overseas, including a two year stint in Tokyo, before returning to the UK in 2008. While in the US I served on the board of Cambridge in America during the Cambridge 800 Year Anniversary fundraising campaign, and kept up contacts with Trinity Hall by hosting several gatherings of Hall members when the Master visited Seattle.

Since returning to the UK I have taken a MSc in Coaching and Behavioural Change at Henley Business School and now practice as an executive coach and facilitator. The research I carried out for my masters focused on the dynamics of multicultural teams.

I have always had a close connection with and affection for Trinity Hall - I am married to a Hall man and have lifelong Hall friends. I look forward to the opportunity to continue to contribute by serving on the THA committee.
