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

# THE MASTER'S REPORT

## A lively and thriving year

In this special year when we celebrate our 675th anniversary and launch our Anniversary Campaign to shape the future of Trinity Hall, it is wonderful to be able to report on a lively and thriving year at College.

General Admission was, as ever, a great celebration, and exam season ran smoothly with some exceptional results, including several University prizes. As our students head off on so many different paths, we're reminded of the enduring legacy and remarkable contributions of Trinity Hall people honoured in the New Year and Birthday Honours lists, in particular Professor Simon Wessely (1975), alumnus and Honorary Fellow and now Knight Grand Cross of the Order of the British Empire, for services to mental health.

We welcomed new Staff Fellows and Research Fellows, as well as new Honorary Fellows and Fellow-Commoners. We said goodbye to some whose careers are taking them elsewhere. We congratulated Fellows on academic promotions and appointments to leading department positions. We celebrated grants, accolades and book publications, as well as a richly deserved Pilkington Prize for excellence in teaching given posthumously to Dr Isabelle McNeill, who is much missed.

Our Senior Tutor and Director of Admissions have been continuing to rebuild a strong Admissions pipeline after Covid, with an innovative new podcast *Cambridge from the Inside* to reach prospective students directly, and targeted programmes to widen participation such as *You'll Fit In* and STEM SMART.

College societies and clubs are firing on all cylinders. The newly refurbished

MCR houses a particularly engaged MCR community, and the new JCR and MCR committees have been constructive partners in College committees this past year. The Choir had a successful tour to Vienna; there were lively society dinners; the Trinity Hall Music Society presented the musical *The Bridges of Madison County*; and Trinity Hall students starred in shows at the ADC Theatre and across Cambridge. Trinity Hall

members featured in at least four May Week Shakespeare productions that I'm aware of, with the Preston Society bringing Shakespeare back to the Fellows' Garden – *Henry IV Part 1*, no less.

There have been many sporting achievements. The men's football team reached Cuppers final, 42 years after the champion team of 1984, losing out to Jesus on penalties in a valiant battle. The Boat Club continued in great heart and spirit, with an incredible performance by W1 at the May Bumps. They went up three places and now sit 2nd on the River, making them the first women's crew to end the Mays in the top two places since the 1983 Headship crew. This year's crew were building on a strong and steady rise by crews over several years, and it was great to see the alumni support on the riverbank. We congratulated postgraduate Jan Helmich (2016), Paralympic bronze medal rower, who was named the 2025 Sports Person of the Year at the University of Cambridge sporting awards.

Beyond College, the sense that we live in volatile times only increased this year. We continued to support students directly affected by global events, and those coping with personal or mental health challenges. We've watched with concern the disarray in US academia, knowing that it has had a direct impact on some students' plans and on research collaborations and conferences involving our Fellows. In the UK, the cuts to Humanities research funding is of real concern, and we have been very glad to be able to extend our postgraduate support funding through philanthropic support, a goal of our Anniversary Campaign as well.

We ran a successful series of events under the *Trinity Hall Spotlights: Space* banner, from an illuminating panel discussion on the latest research about space near and far, to the inaugural Thouless Lecture, given by alumna and Honorary Fellow, Professor Jo Dunkley (1997). We continued Trinity Hall's innovative support for social entrepreneurship, launching Trinity Hall Catalysts programme, in partnership with Cambridge Social Ventures, to support students interested in social innovation. I was personally delighted to award the first Trinity Hall Prize in Student Journalism. Both the Catalysts programme and the Journalism Prize were made possible through philanthropy.

Elements of the Masterplan are becoming reality. O Staircase has been refurbished as part of our commitment to improving the sustainability of our energy consumption. Planning permission has been granted for a major refurbishment of Bishop Bateman Court on Thompson's Lane, to make the building fully accessible and degasified as part of our energy transition. The College has now published a Sustainability Strategy, and we were delighted to win a University Platinum Green Impact Award for our commitment to sustainability.

I very much enjoyed seeing alumni at reunions, THA and Aula Club dinners, and meeting the great Trinity Hall

diaspora, from the US to Hong Kong and Singapore. The Law event in London was a particular highlight as we celebrated Trinity Hall's long and continuing legal tradition and ambition.

Finally, I'd like to thank the Senior Officers, the Vice-Master, Jan Schramm, the Senior Tutor, Michael Sutherland, the Bursar, Tim Harvey-Samuel, and Junior Bursar, Glen Sharp, and the Fellowship and all the staff who make Trinity Hall the special and welcoming place that it is.

# THE BURSAR'S REPORT

## The Anniversary Campaign will be crucial in enabling our future objectives

In our 675th year, we approach the future with firmness of purpose to provide an academic and pastoral environment that is forward-looking, of the highest quality, and sustainable in all senses. College finances in 2024/25 continued to see revenue squeezed and costs grow through rising employment taxes, inflationary pressure on wages and purchases, and well-documented specific pressures on Higher Education. While the 3.1% fee increase for the year 2025/26 is helpful and long overdue, this is offset multiple times by the increase in employer National Insurance contributions imposed in the November 2024 budget. The College aims to offset some of the impact through its endowment (which provides 56.6% of the College's total income), but future investment capacity is constrained by these structural factors. There was good progress in conferencing income and fundraising, and cost control was broadly tight.

The College made purposeful progress on several important objectives in the year. We began the execution of our Masterplan with a refurbishment of O Staircase to enhanced sustainability standards and completed planning for the full refurbishment of Bishop Bateman Court. This will provide 50 rooms in the College's first entirely degasified residential building, a c. £10m project to be funded primarily from our

© Onur Pinar Photography supported by outstanding pastoral care in a sustainable estate which reflects our traditions and faces forward with improved student-facing facilities enabling us to remain competitive with our peers. This Campaign will be the bedrock of our future capacity to invest in our facilities alongside significant contributions from our own resources. Work on strategic purpose and governance made good and coherent progress.

At 30 June 2025, the College's endowment and cash stood at £411.1m (£401.3m). This continues to provide the key bulwark for the resources available to deploy towards achieving our objectives.


The operating deficit is £2.1m (£2.0m); the total deficit (which includes unrestricted, restricted and endowment activity) has grown to £6.3m from £3.1m; the increase is entirely due to a reduction in investment income, which we anticipate being substantially reversed in the coming year. Net assets grew by 3.3% to £430.6m (£416.9m).

### Student support

The College made 84 (97) Cambridge Bursary Scheme awards, out of a Home undergraduate population of 309 (345), equal to 27% (28%). The reduction in student numbers is due to the roll-off of larger undergraduate cohorts from the Covid years. The Educational Premium of £1,000 was disbursed to

own resources despite the pressures mentioned above. The College was awarded a Platinum award in the collegiate University's annual Green Impact Awards; the first time we have reached this level. Underpinning this commitment, the College approved a holistic Sustainability Strategy, based on the studies in the Masterplan, which envisages a 65% reduction in Scope 1 & 2 emissions by 2035.

The College launched its 675th Anniversary Campaign in July. The theme of this £50m campaign is *Believe – Belong – Become*. The Campaign seeks to underpin the College's ability to provide world-class teaching to our students,



22 (19) students. In addition, the College provides further assistance to students through hardship grants, and travel and long vacation residence awards.

The College also provides financial assistance to postgraduates, including scholarships to fund fees and living costs and 'top-up' funding to fill shortfalls in students' funding packages. For the academic year 2024/25, £1.1m (£0.9m) was spent on specific studentships for postgraduates.

The College also supports its entire student body by subsidising their teaching and living arrangements from its endowment. This support was £7.2m (£6.5m), or c. £13,329 per student (£11,470). This is the single largest challenge to our financial position every year and needs to be viewed in the context of the endowments of our global competitors, many in the United States, whose endowments are in the range of \$40-50bn.

### Financial performance

The College recorded an Unrestricted deficit of £2.1m for the year (£2.0m) and a Restricted surplus of £1.3m (£1.3m). The overall deficit was £6.3m (£3.1m). The increase in the overall deficit is mainly due to:

- the presence in 2024 of a £926k writeback with regard to the University Superannuation Scheme; and
- an unusually large gap between investment income and the total return drawdown which the College receives from the endowment under its spending rule. This gap was principally caused by a fall in investment income (£5.0m vs £7.3m in the prior year).

Fee income was stable at £2.9m. Income from residences, accommodation and catering increased by 4.3% to £5.7m

(£5.4m). Our conference and catering business excelled; total revenues reached £1.5m (£1.3m), a 15.3% increase. This represents a record year for this activity, which subsidises our educational activity with its surplus.

As mentioned earlier, investment income fell by 31.5% to £5.0m (£7.3m). The reduction is due to accounting accrual and lower dividend receipts from certain equity funds, most notably those holding tobacco exposure, which the College exited in accordance with its investment policy. There was also a reduction in interest income as some property investments were made. Income flows are expected to improve materially this year as other dividend and rental streams kick in.

Aggregate expenditure increased by 1.9% to £23.4m (£23.0m ex USS); inflation was 4.0% for the year, so overall there was satisfactory cost containment. Expenditure on education grew by 7.1% to £10.2m (£9.5m). This increase is split between increased spending on Scholarships, Teaching and Tutorial, and Admissions and Outreach. In the latter area, we introduced a highly successful podcast series to maximise our accessibility to all candidates.

Donations and new endowments reached £2.8m, a 19% increase, as alumni generously supported the Anniversary Campaign, which will be a crucial element in enabling the College to realise its future objectives.

### Balance sheet and endowment performance

Net assets grew by 3.3% to £430.7m (£416.9m). Investment performance drove this growth, with a total return of 3.5%, a rather tepid year. Appreciation in our international assets was significantly reduced by the 8.5% reduction in the value

of the US dollar versus sterling. We acquired a business park in Girton and, after year-end, repurchased a lease at 90 Hills Road, thus enabling a redevelopment opportunity we have been planning for many years. Each of these holds significant value creation opportunities but requires some investment to enable us to capture that. We also completed an option agreement for a solar farm at our Waltham Abbey site. Cambridge & Counties Bank (CCB) had another strong year. We continue to play an active role on CCB's board and are delighted with the quality of its performance. More information on CCB is available at [ccbank.co.uk](http://ccbank.co.uk).

### Outlook

The cost of our educational activity is now £7.2m higher than our fee income receipts. We cover this each and every year from our endowment return. The launch of the 675th Anniversary Campaign enables us to plan for the continued future delivery of a world-class educational experience for our students, within a sustainable environment that both reflects our traditions and is adapted to current and future student requirements. Campaign launch events around the world have demonstrated the strength of the bond between alumni and the College, and we are profoundly grateful for your support. Our own resources will also make a significant contribution to many of the measures outlined in the Campaign objectives. Together we can realise our ambitions. We do not expect significant change in the challenging sector dynamics we face (although the recent commitment to index linking of fees is welcome), but we do intend to continue to manage our finances to allow us a continuing measure of control over our plans.

# THE SENIOR TUTOR'S REPORT

## Transformational experiences

This is the second academic year I have served as Senior Tutor, and I continue to be inspired by the many and varied achievements of our students and Fellows. We again had some outstanding individual results in the Tripos exams, with eight University examination prizes awarded to Trinity Hall students, including several to students who topped their year. It is encouraging to see so many of our undergraduates applying the knowledge and skills they have learned in their studies to summer research projects and internships. This year, over 30 students were able to work on academic projects over the summer, on topics ranging from advanced genomic techniques at McGill University in Canada to understanding the historic links between Trinity Hall and institutions of slavery here in Cambridge. Many of these transformational experiences are made possible through the generous support offered by our alumni, for which we are extremely grateful.

This year has also seen continued innovation in the way that we offer pastoral care to our students. In line with the University's 'stepped care' model of student mental health support, we have shifted from a 'crisis management' approach at Trinity Hall to a preventative one. We have put in place programmes and structures to equip our undergraduates and postgraduates to manage the day-to-day pressures of modern student life. A key theme is that healthy eating, sleeping, study and social habits can lead to better academic outcomes and a more satisfying student experience. This is something that we try to impress upon our students from the moment

so many other exciting endeavours. This year saw the Hesperides Literary and Arts Society revive *The Crescent* zine and organise a showcase of film, photography, poetry and art to highlight the creativity of our community. Sports remain popular with our students, and we celebrated in particular the success of our women's first boat, who narrowly missed head of the river in the May Bumps. Jan Helmich (2016), a bronze medallist rower in the Paralympics, was named 2025 Sports Person of the Year, an award that recognises the highest-achieving student athlete at the University of Cambridge. I was also proud of the JCR committee for putting on a successful June Event in the face of several cancellations of college May Balls in Cambridge.

they arrive, and a message that Tutors, the Wellbeing team and Directors of Studies try to reinforce. I think that we are starting to see the impacts of this strategy. This past year saw a significant reduction in the number of students who reported acute mental health difficulties to their Tutors.

I will never cease to be amazed at our students' ability to balance the Cambridge academic workload with

Thinking of the next generation of students, this past year has seen us expand the scope of our access and outreach activities. As I write this, I can hear a buzz of voices from Front Court as potential applicants talk to our undergraduates and Fellows on a College Open Day. In addition to running residential events targeting underrepresented and disadvantaged students, the College launched an innovative podcast series intended to confront myths about Cambridge. Called *Cambridge from the Inside*, the series has gained over 100,000 views and gives a balanced and unvarnished account of study in Cambridge, straight from the mouths of Trinity Hall students and Fellows.

This past year has also seen a flurry of activity within the Fellowship itself. Professors Jackson and McLachlan, and Drs Wood and Drieschova published new books, and the laboratory of Professor Kunji published

a study on the role of mitochondria in sugar metabolism in the prestigious journal *Science Advances*. The strong research culture is embedded in our Fellowship and is something we value highly. With this in mind, one of the most exciting aspects of my job is to work with the Fellowships Committee to bring new academics to the College. At the beginning of the 2024/5 academic year, we welcomed new Fellows in biology, English, medicine and politics, further strengthening our research and teaching in these areas. Our Early Career Research Fellowship

programme continues to attract exceptional academics, and this year's competition saw us selecting two future research leaders out of a strong gathered field of 442 applicants.

Finally, I also note, with sadness and with pride, that Dr Isabelle McNeill was posthumously awarded a 2025 University Pilkington Prize for her 'creative, critically vibrant and exemplary contributions to French and to Film & Screen in Modern and Medieval Languages'. Dr McNeill left a profound mark on all those

who interacted with her, and it was heartening to hear from so many of her friends, family, colleagues and former students at the celebration of her life held in June.

Her citation for the Pilkington Prize highlighted her exceptional teaching and support of her students, and the inclusivity and the diversification of materials and approaches that inspired so many. This captures perfectly what we aim to provide Trinity Hall students, and we know that her example will continue to inspire us in the years ahead.

# THE POSTGRADUATE TUTOR'S REPORT

## Bringing experience and vibrancy

The Trinity Hall MCR had an excellent year, with a calendar full of social and academic events. Our MCR members participate in a wide range of national and international activities such as fieldwork, conferences and workshops, thanks to the generous research and financial support provided by the College.

Postgraduate student support is a major focus of the Trinity Hall 675th Anniversary Campaign. MCR members contributed greatly to the success of the Campaign launch event in College, presenting posters on their research and relating their experiences in videos highlighting the importance of postgraduate funding. This year, we provided 13 full studentships, including 11 co-funded with partners such as the Cambridge Trust and the UK Research Councils. We further awarded six partial studentships, including four co-funded ones. The recently established Christopher Padfield Fund has also been a crucial source of support for MCR members, helping fund research and career development activities as well as supporting students facing unforeseen financial hardship. We are hugely grateful to our donors, without whom none of this would be possible.

In the 2024/5 academic year, we had 242 postgraduate students, with 87 new students joining the College. In addition, the MCR has 48 Postdoctoral Research Associates (PDRA), early-career researchers in a variety of fields who bring experience and vibrancy to the MCR community. The MCR Committee, ably led by President Noah Cadwaladr Evans (2023) and Vice-President Soham Kar (2018), has worked hard to ensure that the atmosphere in the MCR is inclusive and

The 2024/5 McLuhan Symposium featured an outstanding series of talks, on topics ranging from astrophysics to heritage studies, with keynotes by two Fellows, Professor Anton Enright (Biology) and Dr Anya Burgon (History of Art).

The Postgraduate Tutor, Professor Sasha Turchyn, took a well-deserved sabbatical over Lent and Easter terms. During this time, I served as Acting Postgraduate Tutor and Dr Louis Klee stepped in as Deputy Postgraduate Tutor, alongside Professor Anton Enright. We are fortunate to have a strong interest across the Fellowship in supporting our postgraduate community. As ever, we owe a huge debt of thanks to the Postgraduate Officer Clare Kerr, who helps us navigate all manner of postgraduate issues with calm and good cheer. She is the first point of contact for many MCR members, and her administrative and organisational skills have been invaluable. We thank Rosie Ince (Tutorial Registrar), Irina Atkinson (Tutorial Administrator) and Julie Powley (Tutorial Office Manager) for their support, as well as Vicky Mills (Admissions Officer) and Dr Marcus Tomalin (Admissions Tutor), who helped us recruit and admit yet another strong cohort into the MCR. We are also grateful to the College's exceptional Wellbeing team for providing essential support to the postgraduate community.

We look forward to another exciting year ahead, and to welcoming new members to our diverse and vibrant MCR. We thank the alumni and friends of the College again for their fantastic support of the postgraduate community.



# THE DIRECTOR OF ADMISSIONS' REPORT

## Pioneering digital outreach

The past twelve months have been an exciting time for everyone involved in Trinity Hall admissions. We have continued to interact with an increasingly diverse range of potential applicants, and, crucially, our flagship widening participation programmes have been more popular than ever. For instance, more than 700 potential applicants registered for the *You'll Fit In* programme, which is aimed at students in Year 12 who are considering applying to Cambridge and who belong to certain underrepresented ethnic groups. Thanks to the tireless work of our brilliant Access and Recruitment Officer, Xanthe Robertson, the webinars and residencies associated with this programme have been a real success, and the feedback from the attendees has been extremely positive. In addition, we have continued to liaise extensively with the schools and colleges in our Link Area (Bristol, Bath & North East Somerset, North Somerset, Somerset, and South Gloucestershire). This work has involved numerous visits to speak to a wide variety of students and their teachers in the South West.

While we remain fully committed to in-person engagement with potential applicants, we have also sought to increase our online presence. This is why, in September 2024, we launched the *Cambridge from the Inside* podcast series, which is designed to offer honest and accessible discussions about various aspects of the admissions process, and to give insights into student life at Cambridge. The episodes are hosted by Siam Rahman, our excellent Access and Outreach Communications Officer, and they consist of interviews with current students and Fellows who discuss topics such as choosing a college, writing personal statements, preparing

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for interviews, and what it is really like to study at Cambridge. Many of the conversations focus on specific Tripos subjects – for instance, Geography, Law, Mathematics and Music – as well as important topics such as wellbeing and the LGBT+ community in Cambridge. Audio versions are released weekly on Spotify, Apple Podcasts, and other platforms, while the filmed versions are made available on the Trinity Hall YouTube channel ([www.youtube.com/@TrinityHallCambridge](https://www.youtube.com/@TrinityHallCambridge)).

We have been thrilled by the enthusiastic response to the podcast series. The

videos have been viewed more than 100,000 times, and the watch-time statistics suggest that our target audience is really engaging with the content we have created. Since no such series existed in Cambridge previously, we have had to pioneer this form of digital outreach within the University, and we remain convinced that resources like this can powerfully support the other types of interactions we have with potential applicants. Given the series' significant impact in a short time, we aim to secure its long-term future. Alumni donations have helped make it possible so far, and we aim to raise further funds through the Campaign. As I write this, the school examination results have been released, and the Summer Pools have just taken place, which means we now know who will be in the 2025 intake. The headline figures are as follows: 110 students will be joining us in October; 25% of them are from overseas; 72% of those from the UK studied at maintained sector schools; the gender balance is 49.5% male, 46.8% female, and 3.7% other. In addition, the College is also in line with official targets for widening participation.

The College was founded for the study of canon and civil law in 1350 and in March we recognised the importance of 675 years of Law at Trinity Hall with a sold-out event at Inner Temple.

We held what we believe was our first alumni event in Devon thanks to generous hosts Kate and Chris Baylis (1993) and were delighted to welcome 50 alumni to lunch in a beautiful setting in the sunshine.

In London, we were delighted to have the opportunity to view the Ceremony of the Keys at the Tower of London thanks to Cortland Fransella (1967), and we met alumni from Wales at the THA regional event in Cardiff.

In College, we concluded our *Spotlights* event theme of politics and moved onto space with Honorary Fellow Jo Dunkley (1997) speaking at our inaugural Thouless Lecture.

**T**his year has been about celebrating the College's past and looking forward to our future.

We launched our 675th Anniversary Campaign in College on 5 July, following launches in New York, Washington DC, San Francisco, Hong Kong and Singapore throughout the past academic year. More than 230 alumni joined us across our launch events to hear more about our theme of *Believe – Belong – Become* as we announced we are halfway towards our target (see page 32).

Last year, we raised £2.9 million. This will have a huge impact on our community. We are very grateful to those who give to our *Think Ahead* fund for us to use where the need is greatest to make a real difference to the future of the College. Donations to our *Think Ahead* fund over the past year will be used to enable talented applicants to come to Trinity Hall for their research, and are supporting the refurbishments of O Staircase and Bishop Bateman Court to make the spaces more energy efficient.

Other donations will also enable us to:

- expand our widening participation programme and implement the STEM SMART programme to encourage sixth formers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics

- ensure we can offer an academic prize in all undergraduate subjects
- support wellbeing and personal growth by enabling students to take part in sport and the arts
- introduce new sustainability initiatives to reduce our reliance on gas.


Following the refresh of our legacy society, we are delighted that over 240 supporters have now remembered the College in their Will.



# THE JUNIOR, BURSAR'S REPORT

## Sympathetic restoration

It has been a busy and proactive year at Trinity Hall, particularly as we weave the celebration of our 675th anniversary into our activities. Last year, I talked about the first stage of the Masterplan, which was to refurbish O Staircase on a sustainability template born from the Sustainability Strategy delivered by our consultants. I'm pleased to say this has been achieved in time for student occupation in the 2025/6 academic year. The fabric has been improved with additional insulation added to the external walls and secondary glazing placed inside the existing windows. We have increased the insulation in the roof void and installed photovoltaic (PV) and solar thermal on top of the roof, all of which will decrease the demand on externally provided energy and start us on the journey to being as self-sufficient as possible.

The second stage of the Masterplan was to degasify, refurbish and make accessible Bishop Bateman Court, a priority due to failing roof tiles. The design team has worked together to deliver a design that meets all the criteria above, and we received planning permission in the summer. The project is currently out to tender, and we hope to start on site in November. The Maintenance team has redecorated and improved 14 to 16 Bateman Street properties to accommodate students who would have normally chosen Bishop Bateman Court as their accommodation this year.

The sympathetic restoration of our river wall turned into a much larger project than initially envisaged, when most of the binding between the bricks crumbled away at the slightest of

touches. Our next aim is to complete the same level of work on the wall that divides Latham Lawn and the Fellows' Garden. We have also resurfaced the entrance to Wychfield to improve the approach to the site.

The next stage of the Masterplan will look at options at our Wychfield site to rehouse the maintenance workshops, which currently sit on Central Site in the basement under Cherry Tree Court. Their relocation will facilitate the opportunity to redevelop Cherry Tree Court.

Our staff consistently deliver excellent service to students, Fellows and guests. The College has been operating at a high and steady level of activity for some time now. What was once considered a temporary fluctuation has now become the norm. Due to a shortage of casual support staff and growing administrative demands, teams are working at high intensity throughout most of the year, supporting students during term time and managing guests and events during breaks, all while maintaining high professional standards.

I'd like to take this opportunity again to thank all our staff who make Trinity Hall the enjoyable experience that it is, and to acknowledge the dedication they all show to their roles.

Financial pressures remain a key focus for us. Whether that is ensuring we get the best value from our purchases or ensuring our staff are paid competitively for all that they do, this is an important ongoing element that can't be overlooked. There was evidence this year that the cost of living hit May Ball week, as a handful of colleges had to pull their events due to low ticket sales. After a lot of effort, our June Event Committee held on and managed to provide a very successful and enjoyable June Event.

For Trinity Hall's 675th year, the Master and Fellows celebrated and thanked the staff through a 675th-themed Staff Garden Party in July, and arranged for group staff and Fellows photographs to be taken in October to mark this important anniversary.

# THE DIRECTOR OF CONFERENCE & CATERING SERVICES' REPORT

## Consistently high standards

**F**ood and hospitality are central to our community. Our role goes beyond simply providing meals and venues; it creates shared experiences, strengthens connections, and reflects the values of the College.

It has been a year of transition within the Conference team, marked by a retirement, maternity leave, promotions, and new appointments. We are proud of how smoothly the team has adapted. Our new colleagues have settled in well and are already making valuable contributions to the wider department. The kitchen has also seen changes, with recruitment of chefs remaining a challenge, yet this has not reduced the consistently high standard of catering we provide, from the cafeteria through to Feasts and all occasions in-between.

We love to encourage creativity and several chefs undertook molecular gastronomy training, leading to the introduction of lemon air and goat's cheese pearls to some of our College menus! Further originality was also on display at the Super Halls: the MCR 80's Neon dinner featured a *Tutti Frutti Rubik's Cheesecake with Pac-Man Shortbread*, while the JCR enjoyed a main course entitled *Who Stole the Tarts?* at their Alice in Wonderland event.

# THE LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

## Celebrate the College's legacy

### Jerwood Library

**E**mbedding equality, diversity and inclusivity (EDI) into the Library's work is important, ensuring that every member of the College community feels recognised, respected and supported. Over the past year, we've introduced a number of initiatives to further this commitment.

Accessibility has been a key focus. The refurbishment of a previously unreliable lift has significantly improved access to the building. This was complemented by the addition of ergonomic furniture and new assistive equipment, helping to create a more welcoming and user-friendly environment.

One of the year's most exciting developments was the launch of our Student Curator projects, designed to enrich the Library's collections – particularly in areas relating to diversity and inclusion. Working closely with Library staff, our student curators selected and promoted resources that highlighted underrepresented voices, regions and genres.

Our first three curators brought great enthusiasm and insight to their projects. Their chosen themes – Pacific peoples' responses to climate change; the role of the arts in health; and Korean literature and language – reflected their personal interests. Each student applied their research and writing skills to critically engage with existing materials, select new titles for the Library, and create eye-catching displays in the entrance hall to share their work with the College community.

The response was overwhelmingly positive. Many featured books were quickly borrowed, and our Library questionnaire included several comments praising the thoughtful and

engaging displays. These student-led projects have not only broadened our collections but also helped foster a more inclusive and reflective library space. The curated collections remain available online, ensuring continued access and engagement. Following the success of this first year, we're excited to be continuing the project into the next academic year.

### The Old Library

**D**escribed on the College website as a 'hidden gem', the Old Library and its collections are among Trinity Hall's most treasured assets. This year, I had the privilege of contributing to a project marking the College's 675th anniversary: the creation of a book celebrating our most remarkable treasures.

With so many fascinating items in both the Library and Archive, narrowing down the selection was no easy task. The final choices range from priceless medieval manuscripts to delightful surprises – like a centuries-old butterfly, preserved between the pages of a book on insects.

Published in November 2025, the book is accompanied by an exhibition showcasing some of the featured treasures. We're excited to share these items with a wider audience and to celebrate the College's historical legacy.

The project also brought a notable increase in research activity. We welcomed 22 researchers who consulted 94 items—an impressive rise from just 18 the previous year. It was a pleasure to see our collections being explored in new and meaningful ways.

We also enjoyed welcoming many visitors to the Old Library throughout the year. One special visit took place ahead of a talk on the music virtuoso George Bridgetower (1778–1860) and his Cambridge connections. The co-presenters – Professor Nicole Cherry, Professor Victoria Avery and Dr Wayne Weaver – viewed a book of violin sonatas once owned by Charles Hague (1769–1821), Professor of Music at Cambridge and a close friend of Bridgetower. Another special moment was a visit from a bridal couple on their wedding day – a touching reminder of the lasting memories this unique space continues to inspire..

# THE DEAN OF CHAPEL'S REPORT

## Promote a meaningful, intelligent encounter

In April 2025, I was invited to speak at the Good Friday service at Yonsei University in South Korea. Yonsei University traces its roots to the founding of the first college teaching Western medicine in Korea by Presbyterian missionaries in 1885. Since 2009, it has not required students to be active Christians, but attendance at some chaplaincy events remains compulsory. At the campus for 'Freshmen', I gave the same address twice, each to 1000 students whose attendance was recorded. Many of those present appeared to spend the time scrolling on their phones. A day later, I recorded the same talk to be watched by the remaining 10,000 undergraduates online, who were required to complete a short report on what was said.

Later, meeting with the dozen chaplains from Yonsei's several campuses and its superb teaching hospital, we talked about our experiences of chaplaincy. Our respective institutions, a private Christian University and a Cambridge college, are very different. But there were similarities too. Both institutions serve the brightest students and, for each of us, the aim is to promote a meaningful, intelligent encounter with Christian faith. Yet the stark contrast between a compulsory and a voluntary approach to chaplaincy made me feel grateful; I have never seen anyone in the Trinity Hall Chapel scrolling their phone. And the fact that our approach to chaplaincy is 'voluntary' made it rewarding this year to prepare three Chapel members for confirmation.

A further reason for gratitude is that it is very rare that an invitation to preach at Trinity Hall is declined. Preachers this year have included, from Cambridge, the Revd Steve Rothwell, Clergy Development Officer for the Ely Diocese, the Revd Canon Jutta Brueck, Vicar of Great St Mary's, and the Revd Prebendary Dr Isabelle Hamley, Principal of Ridley Hall. This visit was particularly welcome as our two excellent ordinands this year, Harri England (2023) and Amelia Enstone (2024), are both training for ordination at Ridley alongside their theological studies at the University. From further afield, we welcomed Professor Willie James Jennings from Yale Divinity School, Fr Dominic White OP, Prior of Blackfriars, Oxford, the Revd Nicholas Mercer of Bolton Abbey and the Rt Revd Rob Saner-Haigh, Bishop of Carlisle. The preacher at the Commemoration of Benefactors' service was the Papal Nuncio to Great Britain, HE Archbishop Miguel Maury Buendía – who was glad to come, given Bishop Bateman's role as a diplomat shuffling frequently between the English and Papal courts.

I am grateful to those of you who have (voluntarily!) read this report and for your continued support and prayers.

# THE HEAD OF WELLBEING'S REPORT

## Empower students to develop

**2**024/25 was an important year for the Wellbeing team as we advanced our project *Improve wellbeing to enhance learning and academic performance*. Inspired by the research of renowned education and wellbeing expert Dr Gareth Hughes, and launched with his support, we engaged around 100 students, staff and Fellows to explore how the College can better enable our students to develop as learners, find a sense of belonging and adopt healthy habits that will positively impact their wellbeing and learning.

Across ten discussions, we learned that Trinity Hall is widely seen as caring, supportive and personable. We also identified opportunities to strengthen academic confidence, reduce impostor syndrome and address challenges such as low self-esteem, loneliness and overwhelm. The findings will directly inform the College's Academic Strategy and fit with our prevention-focused approach: helping students build coping skills, self-efficacy and connection so that potential problems are reduced or avoided. We also continued to test our theory that students are more likely to adopt healthy habits, such as good sleep, social connection and regular exercise, when they see how these behaviours can positively impact their learning and improve academic outcomes.

This year we trialled a wide range of initiatives. Among the most valued were weekly goal-setting breakfasts, exam preparation workshops, end-of-year reflection and planning sessions, and a fortnightly wellbeing newsletter. The weekly *Write TogeTHer* sessions continued to grow in popularity, attracting up to 59 students per week, with peer support and structured time to focus cited as the most valued aspects.

continued to attract high levels of engagement. Our fortnightly roadshows and accompanying graffiti boards provided additional opportunities to engage students on common topics (eg making friends, managing workload), encouraging them to share their tips. This was particularly powerful as students have told us how much they value learning from each other.

By contrast, activities such as weekly social runs, walks and tea breaks at Wychfield drew fewer participants, but still provided useful lessons for shaping future initiatives. Looking forward, we plan to introduce weekly *Using feedback* sessions, post-lunch breaks to increase focus, and *Shut up and write* sessions. We will also trial termly events such

as *End-of-term reflection and planning* sessions and *Effective learning in Cambridge* sessions.

Alongside prevention work, we continue to offer one-to-one support on a wide variety of issues. Our philosophy is to empower students to develop practical skills for managing difficulties rather than escalating or medicalising them unnecessarily. This stepped-care model approach recognises the vital role of peers and tutors in providing pastoral support, with the Wellbeing team available for more challenging matters, and University services offering specialist help when required.

Encouragingly, Trinity Hall students report above-average willingness to seek support from the College or Student Support Services when needed. Engagement with University services, particularly the counselling service, is also above average, suggesting students feel confident in choosing the most appropriate help. Importantly, we see reduced demand for our direct services as a positive indicator that prevention initiatives are effective and students are addressing challenges at the right level.

In 2024/25, we worked with 171 students (188 in 2023/24) on 293 individual cases. The most common issues involved physical health, mental health, wellbeing, bereavement and academic-related matters. These figures highlight the breadth of needs we support but also reinforce the value of our proactive initiatives in strengthening the overall student experience at Trinity Hall. Furthermore, we see the decrease in the number of intermissions, the overall improvement in academic results and the fact that Trinity Hall students report above average levels of satisfaction with life as compared to other colleges (annual Pastoral Survey) as encouraging signs that we are heading in the right direction.

# THE DIRECTOR, OF MUSIC'S REPORT

## Eclectic student-led musical activities

**H**aving been on sabbatical leave at this point last year, it's very good to reflect here upon some of the musical highlights in College over the past two academic years.

The Chapel Choir has made great strides forward during this time and it has been truly gratifying to see our choristers and organ scholars enjoy meeting the demands of some increasingly challenging repertoire. The 2024 Michaelmas term concluded notably with a video recording of our newly commissioned carol *A Tender Shoot* composed by the British composer, Ben Ponniah – the première of which the Choir had given during the College's Advent Carol service alongside works by McDowell, Ord, McGlade, Rodney Bennett and Leighton. Highlights during the Lent term included the Commemoration of Benefactors, a joint evensong in collaboration with the choir of St Mary Magdalene, Richmond under the direction of former Trinity Hall Organ Scholar, Seb Gillot (2012), and a memorable service of music and readings for Lent during which the Choir gave a stunning performance of Bairstow's *The Lamentation*. Outside of Full term, the Choir has continued to venture beyond the UK – undertaking two hugely enjoyable concert tours to Malta (2024) and to Austria (2025), where they performed in the magnificent spaces and acoustics offered by the churches of St Lawrence, Birgu; St Dominic & The Blessed Virgin, Rabat; Mosta Rotunda; the Peterskirche and Stephansdom, Vienna and the Dompfarre St Martin, Eisenstadt. The musical, educational and social value of such trips is always especially evident in the weeks which follow and the Choir's impressive development during the Easter term culminated in a tremendous

performance of Howells' resplendent *Gloucester Service* – a great testament to all that this year's cohort have accomplished together.

Whilst a separate report of the Trinity Hall Music Society's activities can be found elsewhere in this publication, it would be remiss of me not to mention here the two superb College musicals which took place during the Lent terms

of 2024 and 2025, namely Stephen Sondheim's *Merrily We Roll Along* and Jason Robert Brown's *The Bridges of Madison County*. It has been wonderful in recent years to see the revival of this much-valued annual College tradition and we congratulate all of the students concerned for their impressive work, imagination, talent and enterprising use of the College's Lecture Theatre.

Alongside these and so very many other eclectic student-led musical activities, the College has also continued to support an extremely popular series of professional concerts. This year, the uniquely intimate dimensions of the award-winning WongAvery Music Gallery inspired a termly series of concerts entitled *Bach Dialogues*, in which baroque violinist Rachel Stroud and I performed a complete cycle of J S Bach's *Sonatas for Violin & Obbligato Harpsichord*. Further events in the Senior Combination Room and Dining Hall have included performances by Canzona, The Odysseus Piano Trio (featuring Trinity Hall alumna, Sara Trickey (1994)), the Cambridge String Quartet – who offered a fascinating programme celebrating the life of Trinity Hall alumnus George Bridgetower (the virtuoso violinist of African descent and original dedicatee of Beethoven's *Kreutzer Sonata*) and, most recently, by the acclaimed tenor Nicholas Mulroy who, together with lutenists Elizabeth Kenny and Toby Carr, gave an unforgettable recital juxtaposing songs from 17th century Europe with those of Modern Latin America.

The musical life of Trinity Hall continues to thrive and we look forward to what the year ahead may bring!

## The MCR focus this year has been community building



We, as the MCR, have been pleased to join in with the festivities. Several events were planned for a particularly long Giving Day (67 hours and 30 minutes) in May; at the start of July, postgraduate students shared current research as part of the campaign launch; and MCR members made contributions to *A Trinity Hall Treasury*, a copy of which has been ordered to be placed in the Blue Room of the MCR. In contrast to the grand scale of Trinity Hall's past and future, the focus within the MCR for Soham (Vice-President) and me this year has been community building and trying to further cultivate and encourage a friendly, welcoming atmosphere for all our members.

At the start of Michaelmas, a full Freshers' Week timetable was enjoyed by new and continuing postgraduate students alike. This included, amongst other festivities, a walk to Grantchester, a visit to Kettle's Yard, and a range of evening activities. ## History Society

The History Society has hosted a variety of talks this year, beginning in Michaelmas with Dr Liz Egan presenting her research on how Trinity Hall's historical association with training students in canon and civil law informed its connections to the practice of slavery, as part of the College's *Legacies of Enslavement* project. This was followed by the return of former Fellow Dr David Cowan who gave an overview of his recently published book *Politics of the Past*, looking at the role of memory in informing the popular politics of 20th century Britain, and how this is relevant to what we see in British politics today. Dr Edd Mair finished off the term with a talk looking at the primitive presentations of Native Americans in the abolitionist writings of the mid-19th century United States. Lent was a little quieter, with Professor Sujit Sivasundaram speaking on the environmental history of the Indian Ocean, taken from the perspective of a variety of small material objects that humans have interacted with over many centuries. This was followed by the whistlestop tour provided by Dr Victoria Avery and Dr Nicole Cherry of the life of 18th century black violinist George Bridgetower, a contemporary and friend of Beethoven, and a member of Trinity

Hall where he earned his Batchelor of Music. This was presented in relation to an exhibition at the Fitzwilliam Museum in which he was featured, entitled *Rise Up: Resistance, Revolution, Abolition*. Fittingly, the talk was accompanied by several musical interludes, including some wonderful virtuosic moments from Nicole herself on the violin. Easter saw the annual Society Dinner, where we were joined by former President of the Royal Historical Society, Professor Emma Griffin, who spoke about her unusual journey from a scientific background into historical study. We look forward to an equally exciting programme of events in the coming year.

## Law Society

The strategic vision of the Trinity Hall Law Society during the College's 675th year is three-fold: to bridge the gap between academic learning in the classroom and the real-world application of law; to help members (including non-law students) find the right career path for them; and to build a support network for law students. We saw an increase in interest from non-law students and took proactive steps to ensure our events reflected our broader membership.

To achieve the first pillar of objectives, we invited Jessica Gavron (1987) from the European Human Rights Advocacy Centre to speak about human rights developments. Our Annual Dinner was also an opportunity for alumni and current students to meet and connect over their time spent studying at Trinity Hall and their hopes for the future. Our alumni guest speaker, Her Honour Judge Carolyn Hilder (1987), gave an inspiring speech about her work at the Court of Protection, giving a realistic picture of the applications of legal concepts that students are learning at university.

Earlier in the day, HHJ Hilder also adjudicated the Trinity Hall Law Society Annual Moot, a one-day moot on topics in criminal law, where our first-year lawyers displayed their argumentation and oral advocacy skills.

The second pillar encouraged the Committee to organise our first-ever Trinity Hall Alumni Careers Panel, inviting distinguished alumni Ruth Byrne KC (1997), Dr Cameron Miles

(2012), Tristan Pedelty (2002) and Gillian Higgins (1994) to share their experiences at Trinity Hall and discuss their current work. From public international law to the civil service, the event included dynamic exchanges between the panellists and attracted well over 80 sign-ups from across the University.

For aspiring solicitors, we worked with international firms such as Slaughter and May and Herbert Smith Freehills (as it then was) throughout the year to host networking dinners and an application workshop.

Lastly, the Committee organised a wide range of social activities in pursuance of the third pillar – ranging from social swaps with other law societies to welfare drop-ins. We celebrated the end of the year with a revival of the much-missed Garden Party, where we enjoyed drinks and pizza in the Fellows' Garden.

## Music Society

## Eden Oration

6 December 2024

PROFESSOR  
ANDREW MURRAY

**Professor of Metabolic Physiology, Fellow and Director of Studies in Natural Sciences (Biological). His research is concerned with the effect of factors such as disease, diet and exercise on mitochondrial function and physiological performance.**

Dr Thomas Eden signed and dated his last will and testament on 24 January 1643.

There are scant weather records for the winter of 1643, but nothing to suggest that this was anything other than a typically dreary January day, when the chill never quite leaves your bones. It is perhaps no surprise that when Dr Eden's thoughts turned very generously to us – the future Master, Fellows and Scholars of that poor Society by the River Cam – and considered how he might provide for us, his thoughts turned to fuel. Fuel, in the form of wax candles to provide light and a modest amount of warmth on a cold evening in Chapel, but also the metabolic fuel of Wine and Diet which we will enjoy later this evening.

The release of energy from fuel, whether we burn a wax candle or

metabolise the constituent parts of a meal, fundamentally relies on the same simple chemical reaction, whereby reduced carbon in hydrocarbons and carbohydrates is converted to carbon dioxide and water. Those of you who remember the fire triangle from your GCSE chemistry will recall that another essential participant of this reaction is oxygen, specifically diatomic oxygen, O<sub>2</sub>, the gas that makes up nearly 21% of the present-day atmosphere on Earth.

Most multicellular organisms rely on a continual supply of oxygen to support metabolic function, and therefore life. Some animals show remarkable physiological adaptations that allow them to tolerate extended periods of hypoxia (low oxygen) or even anoxia (a complete lack of oxygen) – species as diverse as Weddell seals, naked mole rats and the crucian carp. But these really are exceptions. Just as a candle starved of oxygen will extinguish, so too will a human life, and unlike fuel, which we store in great quantities in adipose tissue and other organs, we have only a very limited capacity to store any oxygen at all.

Pope Francis named Archbishop Miguel Maury Buendía as Apostolic Nuncio to Great Britain on 13 April 2023.**

Dear brothers and sisters, I am very pleased to be present this evening as you celebrate this Commemoration of Founder and Benefactors service. I am grateful to the Reverend Dr Stephen Plant for the invitation to preach, and to the Master, Mary Hockaday, for the kind welcome.

To each participant at this Evensong, and all the students and staff of Trinity Hall, I bring

the blessing and greetings of Pope Francis. Please keep him in your prayers, too!


It is a particular honour to mark this occasion, considering the diplomatic role played by the founder of your College on behalf of the Pope in the fourteenth century. As you well know, on more than one occasion, Bishop William Bateman served as Papal Legate, working for reconciliation between England and France – thankfully not work I have had to do myself! His founding of this College was also in service to the Church: to train clergy after the devastation of the Black Death. This is a legacy to celebrate! It is good for us to remember our Christian heritage, to learn from the mistakes of our past, and to celebrate faith in Christ for the formation of the spiritual, cultural and political life of this continent over the centuries.

A similar message comes from the prophet Isaiah, which we have just heard in the First Lesson. The prophet calls Israel to "look to the rock from which you were cut". God's people are encouraged to remember the blessings of the past in order to better understand the present and to have hope for the future. The Israelites are here offered a message of encouragement during their time of exile: that just as God has been with them in the past, so too will he lead them forward to a new life.

# THE TRINITY HALL ASSOCIATION, SECRETARY'S REPORT

## A truly international audience

**A**s reported at the 2024 AGM, the Association successfully defended itself against litigation brought against it over several years. Until this year, the litigation absorbed much of the Committee's attention – and THA funds – but we are now better able to look forward with confidence. Financially, we expect to return to a net asset position within the coming year, which will allow us to subsidise the costs of events to encourage even more alumni connections.

Alumni events and allocation of the THA Volunteering Awards continue to be our core activities, organised through four Committee meetings per year. The June meeting was held at the RAF Club in London, thanks to (co-opted) Committee member, James Poynton (2018), who explained the significance of many of the paintings and memorial pieces on display.

Committee membership is formally confirmed each year at the AGM, with members now spanning some three and a half decades of matriculation years, with representation from 1974 to 2018. This year, the President, Guy Brannan (1974), acknowledged the dedicated service given by The Reverend Cortland Fransella (1967) and Dr David Billett (1968), who both retired. Cortland consistently offered wise comment in discussion and generously shared his contacts, also facilitating the popular visit to the Tower of London last February, which will be

repeated in 2026. Before the secretarial and events duties were separated in 2023, David had managed a considerable workload over four years,

covering both roles and arranging enjoyable dinners at the Shakespeare Library in Birmingham and The New Club in Edinburgh, among others. He kindly stayed on for another two years to share his valuable experience.

The year's activities have enjoyed an extra energy arising from the 675th anniversary, including a fascinating panel presentation at the AGM, relating to the history of the College, which was streamed to reach those unable to attend in person. Talks by Alexandra Browne (College Archivist), Drs Justin Davies (Fellow-Commoner, History of Art), and Dr Sandra Raban (Emeritus Fellow and College Legend), were both informative and amusing. The historical perspective was followed by a look to the future with the Master, the Bursar and the Senior Tutor. The THA Annual Dinner that evening was attended by a record 136 alumni and guests, covering matriculation years from 1951 right up to 2024. The 1995 year-group took the opportunity to meet up and attend the Dinner together – enjoying the unusual perspective from tables set up in the gallery at the screens end of the Hall!

On 7 June, the regional Alumni Dinner took place at the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama, a fine modern building located at the edge of Bute Park close to the quirky Cardiff Castle.

We enjoyed an informative tour of the College – imbued with the imprint of great Welsh artistes – followed by dinner in the Anthony Hopkins Centre, formerly the stable block of Cardiff Castle, one of only two stable buildings designed by William Burges. Added interest lay in the collection of 19th and 20th century paintings on the walls of the dining room. Guests said they particularly appreciated the Welsh location, and the event was fully booked, with 39 attendees ranging from matriculation years 1959 to 2001.

The Tower of London's Ceremony of the Keys in February was a highly popular event and will be repeated in February 2026 to allow more alumni to experience it. This 800-year-old tradition is repeated every evening

as the Tower is secured for the night. For 65 THA guests, the atmospheric Ceremony was preceded by an entertaining tour of the Tower by one of the practised Yeoman Warders and access to the Warders' bar for drinks.

Applications for the THA Volunteering Awards covered a range of diverse and interesting projects, including examples that reflect today's community needs: an intergenerational project supporting access to nature in Cambridge; addressing climate change and sustainable farming in Ireland; working with local staff on educational material for conflict-affected communities; and assessing the impact of societal attitudes to displaced people from queer and trans communities in Turkey. The student engaging in this project

gave a moving presentation before September's AGM, and the Committee was particularly pleased to hear how the work aligned with their plans for a future career influencing policy in this field. Project reports are published on the THA section of the College website as the students submit them.

As ever, we offer particular thanks to Rachelle and the team in the Alumni & Development Office and to the Master and the College staff for their consistent support of the Association, which enables us to fulfil our purpose to keep alumni connected.
